Dear Parents /Carers

Time is flying by, it seems like only a few days since we returned after the Christmas holidays yet we are already nearly at half term. January signals the beginning of the last full term of Year 11 and Year 13 students' time at school; it is sobering to think that they now have approximately 12 weeks of school left before their exams begin. Year 11 sat their mock examinations before the Christmas holidays. Year 12 have just had their mock examinations and Year 13 will be starting theirs soon. Revision and coursework sessions have started for Year 11 and 13 at both lunchtimes and after school to support students in preparing for their exams.

The Autumn term felt like it was a step back to a more normal life in school and at times it really did feel that things were getting back to normal. Teachers were back in their classrooms and students were moving around the building. Extra-curricular activities started up again, with a varied programme including PE and Performing Arts. There were times when COVID did cause disruption to school life with students and staff absent due to the virus and through the reintroduction of face masks. We are very proud of how our students adapted to the disruption and followed the rules put in place to keep everyone safe. I am hopeful that Spring signals an end to most of the measures we have had to live with due to the pandemic and we will be back to normality soon. I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for the support we have received throughout this time and I will keep you updated on any changes.

News

National Tutoring Programme & School Led Tuition:

We are using some of our Pupil Premium and Recovery Premium funding to access the National Tutoring Programme and School Led Tuition. The National Tutoring Programme gives schools access to subsidised tuition in blocks of 15 hours. We have around 175 students from Years 7 to 11 who are beginning their tuition blocks this week, studying a range of subjects in groups of up to three students, both during the school day and after school; some will be joining in from home whilst others will stay in school.

We are also delivering 15-hour blocks of School Led Tuition, working in small groups with 48 Year 9s on English and 48 Year 10s on Maths. This will take place over the Spring and Summer terms.

All of the tuition is carefully designed to address our students' needs, with our teachers using their assessments to identify the objectives for the tutors. The very small groups mean that the tutors can work closely with our students and ensure that they adapt the sessions to support and maximise students' progress.

If you received information about the National Tutoring Programme but did not complete the online consent form, please do, as further tuition opportunities can be arranged.

Safeguarding Update

Following an Ofsted review published on Thursday 10 June 2021, we wanted to share with you some updates on what they have found. The report highlighted that young people nationally feel that sexual harassment, unwanted sexual behaviours and online sexual abuse, is so commonplace that they no longer think about reporting it. The problem extends beyond schools with most incidents occurring online or in social situations away from education settings.

Sexual harassment is defined as unwanted and unwelcome behaviour of a sexual nature which can occur online and offline. The definitions used by the Department for Education (DfE) are as follows:

- Peer on peer sexual abuse: this includes sexual violence, sexual harassment, up-skirting and sexting.
- Sexual harassment: this includes sexual comments, sexual jokes or taunting, physical behaviours such as deliberately brushing against someone, displaying pictures, photos or drawings of a sexual nature
- Online sexual harassment: this includes sharing of sexual images, sexual comments and messages, sexual exploitation, coercion and threats
- Sexual violence

We want to assure you that we take all concerns which may be raised involving sexual harassment and sexual violence, seriously. Any allegation will be dealt with in line with DfE guidance and Keeping Children Safe in Education, 2021.

Staff at Caldew School are expected to challenge any form of derogatory or sexualised language or behaviour and have been trained to share any safeguarding concerns raised about a child by reporting this to the school's Designated Safeguarding Lead. This is to ensure the child receives appropriate support. We are also continuing to actively encourage all students to "call-out" and report any incidents they may see or experience.

Children who are victims of sexual violence and sexual harassment (online or offline) will likely find the experience stressful and distressing. This kind of behaviour is never acceptable and it is important that all victims are taken seriously and offered appropriate support.

We will discuss any concerns about a child with the child's parents/carers and will normally notify the parents of all the children involved, unless we believe that notifying the parents would increase the risk to the child.

We are aware that we also have a crucial role to play in teaching young people about sexual consent, healthy relationships and respect for others and we will continue to do this through our Learning for Life curriculum; form tutor time and year group assembly programme.

Careers Education Information Advice and Guidance (CEIAG)

Year 9 Futures Day

Unfortunately, the Year 9 Futures Day on the 25 January had to be postponed. We still hope to offer visits to further and higher Education venues free of charge, with the aim of equipping students with information and guidance about a variety of career choices. The visits would give Year 9 the opportunity to explore a wide variety of vocations, careers and qualifications open to them once they leave school. Each venue would focus on a different career area for example the students visiting Carlisle College will take part in activities in Mechanics, Construction, Catering, Music and Drama. We hope to visit Northumbria University where the focus will be on Business, Law, Accounting, Sport and Engineering and at the University of Cumbria, it is Criminology and the wide range of weird and wonderful courses they have to offer. We hope to re-arrange this for Year 9 as soon as the venues allow us to visit again.

Year 9 Options Process

The spring term promises to be an eventful one for Year 9 as we prepare students to choose their options for their GCSEs. We have planned a week of options assemblies where students will be introduced to our wide variety of GCSE subjects before our Options/Parents Evening on Thursday 24 February. The Options Evening will give you the opportunity to discuss the progress and attainment of your child and find out more about the subjects at GCSE. It is a very exciting time for students and the school is here to help and support students at this time. Miss Eastburn, our Careers Advisor, is available for anyone who needs any guidance in choosing their subjects.

What CEIAG have we provided to students so far this year?

- Year 12 and 13 have visited Northumbria University for a tour of the campus and participated in workshops. They also visited the Apprenticeship Careers Fair.
- Year 11 World of Work Day was delivered very successfully at the end of last year with positive student, staff and employer feedback. A variety of workshops took place, workshops included; CV Writing, Application Forms, Labour Market Information, Progression Routes, Team Building, Effective Communication, Career Action Plan and a NCS Presentation.
- Year 11 were invited to the Virtual Careers Fair in October which usually takes place at the Sands Centre. Large numbers of Cumbrian employers, apprenticeship organisations, sixth forms and colleges were present as well as some universities. Organisations ranged from large countywide employers such as the NHS, Cumbria County Council and United Utilities to key employers that recruit more locally in the different parts of Cumbria including Sellafield, Sellafield contractors/supply chain and BAE Systems as well as a host of small and medium sized employers who stepped forward to provide information about the opportunities they offer.
- Careers interviews have taken place with over 150 students from Year 11. These were one-to-one interviews with Miss Eastburn, our Careers Advisor. Each student was given a career progression plan and will have a follow up interview in due course.
- Students in Year 11 have had assemblies in October with Carlisle College and Hello Future to inform them about the pathways available to them in the future.
- Mr James, the Head of Sixth Form has also spoken to Year 11 to discuss the exciting courses Caldew has to offer here in our School Sixth Form.
- A careers' focus area has been set up in The Curve. The information here signposts students to further career information.
- Social Media is being used, with CEIAG information passed on to students via Instagram, Twitter and Facebook.
- Our school website and Firefly also have a "Careers" section where students can find advice and guidance about careers.
- Year 12 Dream Placement has begun and several of our students have been accepted onto the scheme.
- Our LfL (Learning for Life) team have been busy ensuring students are being taught all about careers in their lessons. Schemes of work for Years 7 -11 incorporate various topics that will be helpful in terms of deciding on the best career. Students will complete these topics throughout the year.

What are our next steps?

- Students in Years 7-11 will have CEIAG assemblies tailored to the needs of their Year Group in January 2022.
- Caldew's Sixth Form online Open Evening takes place on Thursday 10 February. The new prospectus is available soon with details of the range of courses on offer. Students will have the opportunity to chat to course teachers and the Head of Sixth Form.
- All Year 12 students will be offered a one-to-one careers interview.
- Year 10 will be visiting colleges and universities in June.
- We have a visit from the BBC in March which is linked to careers.
- There are workshops and activities running throughout the rest of the academic year so watch this space!

Applying for Free School Meals and Clothing Grants

Cumbria County Council has an online application process for Free School Meals and Clothing Grants. This can be found via the Citizen's portal, at this link:

The online service has a number of benefits:

- Parents/guardians are able to check eligibility without waiting for a phone call/email from the Service Centre
- Reduces the risk of duplicate applications being submitted for the same child
- Reduces the risk of application forms and supporting documentation getting lost in the post
- Provides the Service Centre with an audit trail of applications
- Enables the Service Centre to issue vouchers in a more timely manner; a postal application takes twice as long to process as an online application

Free school meals and clothing vouchers are available if parents/guardians are receiving one of the following qualifying benefits:

- Income Support (IS);
- Income Based Jobseekers Allowance (IBJSA);
- An income-related Employment and Support Allowance;
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999;
- Child Tax Credit, provided parents/guardians are not entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual income (as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs) that as of April 2012 does not exceed £16,190. Note: From 1st May 2009 where recipients are entitled to Working Tax Credit during the four-week period immediately after employment ceases, or after start to work less than 16 hours per week, your children are entitled to Free School Meals, this may be extended.
- The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit;
- Universal Credit
- Children who receive Income Support or Income Based Jobseekers Allowance in their own right are also entitled to receive Free School Meals.
- Children who receive "education suitable for children who have not attained compulsory school age" will still need to satisfy the additional requirement of "receiving education both before and after the lunch period", before being eligible to receive free school meals.

Procedure for School Closure

When we return to school in January we enter that part of winter where we are more likely to have inclement weather. We will only close the school as a very last resort and the default position will always be to stay open. At times some bus routes may be cancelled but the school remains open for those students who can make it. The reality is that there may be occasions when the site is deemed unsafe or we may have insufficient staff that can get into school and in this case we may need to close either fully or for some year groups. If this should happen then the closure will be announced via the school text system, the school website and through local media channels as early as is practical. If you changed your mobile or email contacts please let the School Office know so that we can update our records accordingly.

Free Period Products for Schools

You may have seen in the news about how the government is picking up the work of the 'Red Box Project' charity by providing free period products for schools. We have been part of the 'Red Box Project' for a while now and will be continuing to provide free period products through the new government scheme. This means that girls are able to access sanitary towels, tampons etc. whenever they need them in school.

Behaviour on the School Buses

As a school we have a high number of students who travel on buses to and from school on a daily basis and as a whole we are very pleased with student behaviour whilst on route. However, occasionally it comes to our attention that some students have not been meeting our basic expectations whilst on the buses. There is no doubt that this is the behaviour of a minority of students. I would like to remind all students and parents that under the general power of discipline in the 2012 Education Act, the journey home from school falls under the responsibility of the school, as such we will always follow up reports of unacceptable behaviour on buses when we become aware of issues, which may lead to loss of social time, ban from the bus, suspension or other school sanctions.

If you are aware of concerns on the buses please ask your son/daughter to speak to a member of staff at the school (Form Tutor, Pastoral Manager, Head of Year).

Year 11

Year 11 worked really hard in the Autumn term. The December mocks will have given the students a taste of what the 'real' GCSEs will be like. What went well? What do they need to improve on? There are many students who should be commended for their efforts as they have now seen that by consistently working hard during lessons, acting on the advice given to them by their teachers and revising thoroughly at home, they have experienced success and should feel very proud of themselves. For students who are disappointed with their mock results, it has been a time for reflection. Your teachers will be able to help you understand where you went wrong and support you with what you need to do differently to answer questions successfully and maximise your marks. There is still time to make a difference to your grades.

To support the work that students are doing in lessons, we have encouraged students to use the online revision site, Seneca (www.senecalearning.com). Seneca is a free online revision platform. It presents subject content, organised by a helpful checklist, and uses self-marking questions to check understanding along the way. It is based on the evidence from research into effective revision, working on the principle that a sequence of revision and testing helps students to retain what they've learnt. Students and parents can set up accounts and then create personalised online dashboards for the courses that are studied. Students are also very welcome to use the facilities in school to support their revision. Students can work in school from 3.10 to 4.10pm each afternoon. They can attend a revision session offered by a department or they are welcome to use the IT facilities in the curve.

We are now only twelve school weeks from the start of the GCSE exams. Every school day attended, maximises an opportunity to learn and make progress towards achieving the final goal of securing the grades a student wants in order to progress to the next level of learning and life-long opportunities. It is going to take lots of hard work, focus and determination over the next few months but you can do it, Year 11. Aspire – Believe – Achieve!

Mock exam week commences 8 February. Students will be completing key assessment tasks which will be suitable to support Teacher Assessed Grades if Ofqual's contingency plan is needed in the unlikely event that the exams don't go ahead. These are not additional assessments, but key assessment tasks used diagnostically to prepare for the Summer exams.

Year 11 Parents' Evening is on 3 February. This will allow you and your son/daughter to speak to each subject teacher and find out what needs to be done to help secure academic success; what revision should be in place and what support is on offer in school. Post-16 options are also continuing to be discussed with students during this term. Every Year 11 will have had a careers interview with Miss Eastburn to help support them to make informed choices with the next stages of their education or training, whether that will be at Caldew School or with another post-16 provider. The Caldew 6th form Open evening is on Thursday 10 February and is an excellent opportunity to talk to subject teachers and find out more about the post-16 courses that will be on offer.
