Dear Parents /Carers

It has been an extremely positive and busy start to the school year, it is hard to believe that eight weeks have flown by already. Year 7 have settled into the school really well and they are a wonderful addition to our school community. The next few months do bring challenges as the mornings get darker, it gets colder and students get tired. It is important to remember that time never comes back, we all need to keep focused on learning and to keep trying to be the best we can be. This half term is a busy one, especially for Year 11 who will be sitting their mock examinations in just a few weeks' time. It is important that students take these seriously and revise for them as these examinations will give us all a good indication of the progress they are making towards their target grades. Year 11 students have been given advice on different revision techniques that they can use to help them prepare for their mock examinations.

News

School Performance Tables

In August our students received their GCSE and A level results and we were very proud and delighted that they achieved the best results the school has ever had. This included significant improvements in the GCSE results in Maths, Science and History. These three subjects were mentioned in the OFSTED report and the results showed that improvements have already been made in these areas. The provisional 2018 school performance tables have now been published by the Department for Education and these confirm the improvements in our exam results. Our Progress 8 score is positive. Progress 8 measures the performance of students across eight subjects including Maths, English, three EBacc and three other subjects. Our Attainment 8 score which is the average grade across the same eight subjects is above both national and Cumbrian averages. Our EBacc points score is also above both national and Cumbrian averages. This is the average grade achieved by students in Maths, English, two science subjects, a humanities and a language. Sixth Form Applications

As part of the advice and guidance given to students, Year 11s have received a presentation about their options in the Sixth Form and what Caldew can offer. The courses offered, extra-curricular opportunities and issues such as the different types of qualifications were all explained to the students. They were given a subject survey form to complete which had to be returned to Student Services by Monday 12th November. This will help to create a final subject choice form which matches as many students' choices as possible. The survey sheet was sent home with an explanation sheet so that parents and guardians could be involved.

The next step in finding out about what students want to do is the Sixth Form Open Evening on Thursday 24th January 2019. At this event, students and parents will be able to talk to individual teachers about the specifics of the A level courses on offer. This is the best way to have particular questions about subjects answered by the subject teachers. Even if students know what they want to do, they should attend to gain as much information as possible. The students worked so hard on their polished performances and were a joy to watch. Charity Concert

The Caldew Choir performed at a special charity night raising money for fellow student Alice Tyson. Alice has XP (Xeroderma Pigmentosum), has undergone many operations and will continue to have many more in the future. The charity event at Harraby Catholic Club raised over £2,000 on the evening with a number of performers taking part. The Caldew Choir sang three songs from their musical 'Oliver' and went down a storm! Mark Winter, organiser of the event said: "Just to say a very big thank you to you for helping me with the charity show for Alice. The choir were fantastic, and everybody was saying that they really enjoyed their performance, not only a great choir but the kids were great and I am sure that they also had a great night. Attendance

Our attendance for the first half term was 96%. This is a pleasing consistent trend in our attendance. Thank you for supporting our school community in raising attendance. We aim for every student to sustain and improve their attendance up to Christmas. As the winter season approaches, we ask you to continue encouraging high attendance. When considering your child's attendance, something to take into account is whether you would take a day off work for the same ailment. With the changes to the curriculum, high attendance is vital to ensure maximum progress. Last academic year we discussed with students that one day off results in five hours of learning missed. This academic year our focus is one day off means five hours of learning to catch up. Teachers will give great support to ensure no student is left behind but students need to take responsibility to ensure that they attend and achieve. Keeping in Touch

Safety at the Start and End of the School Day

Parking and access to the school is a continuing challenge. The road at the front of school gets very busy especially at the end of the school day and the safety of our students is obviously our priority. To that end I would like to remind you that:

- Students should not be picked up or dropped off in the Visitors Car Park (next to Reception)
- No cars should be parked in the bus bays along the front of the school at the end of the school day
- Cars should not stop or park on the footpath opposite the school. It is dangerous for students to cross the road and increases the volume of traffic.
- Parents should never park in the roadway leading to Nestlé. This is a private road and is extremely busy with lorries constantly needing access to the site.
- If parking is not available at school there is a car park a short walk away in Dalston village.

Students Cycling to School

Students that cycle to school should exit the school premises directly onto the cycle path via the gate at the rear of the Agriculture block. This is a safer way for them to access the village and join the Carlisle road away from buses, pedestrians and other road users. The gate to the cycle path will also be open each morning and students should enter the school via this route rather than from the front of school. We also strongly encourage students to wear cycle helmets. As we move into the darker mornings and evenings, please ensure students wear appropriate bright/high visibility clothing and their bikes are fitted with lights.

Holidays and Other Absences in Term Time

I would like to remind parents of the following extract from the school's Attendance Policy:
Parents should not book family holidays during term time as they will not be authorised unless there are exceptional circumstances, such as a parent returning on leave from active military service. Parents may request other leave of absence, however, authorisation of this will be at the discretion of the school, and will only be considered in exceptional circumstances. This means that in the majority of cases requests will not be authorised unless there are clear immediate family reasons or educational benefits.

Penalty Notices may be issued by the Headteacher against parents who take unauthorised holidays or leave of absence in term time. Each situation will be considered on an individual basis.

If leave is granted, parents must appreciate it is their responsibility to ensure their child catches up with any missed work upon their return.
