News

Exam Results

GCSE – We are very pleased with our results and I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate all our students on their achievements which are the culmination of five years of hard work and study. We are especially pleased with the high number of grade 9, 8 and 7s achieved by our students. There were many students who achieved outstanding results but a special mention has to go to Thomas Storey who achieved an amazing 8 grade 9s and 2 grade 8s.

The number of students who achieved in Maths and English remains strong and the percentage of students achieving a grade 4 or above in both these important subjects will again be in line with the anticipated national average. Science results improved for a second year and will be again above the national average. As a comprehensive school we are also proud to see that 99.5% of students leave with at least 5 or more passes. However, we are not complacent and there remains work to be done. I am very ambitious for our students and I have high expectations of what they can achieve.

At A level, the school's results maintained our strong record with improvements in many areas. Congratulations should go to all the Year 13 students on their A Level results. There were many standout results but a special mention goes to Robert Wilkins who is going to Oxford University to study History. All students achieved the grades they needed to move onto their choice of university or into jobs with training.

CEIAG Autumn Term

What is CEIAG?

- CEIAG (Careers Education Information Advice and Guidance) is provided to all students in Years 7-13.
- Caldew School has been accepted as part of the "Cumbria Careers Hub". This will allow us to work with other schools, employers and advisors in Cumbria on our careers' provision.
- Partnership links have been set up with Inspira, The Local Enterprise Company, The Careers Enterprise Company, A county council Enterprise Advisor, Hello Future, Work Experience Advisor and The Job Centre.

What CEIAG can we look forward to in the Autumn Term?

- Year 11 World of Work Day on 20th November. This will involve a variety of workshops in the morning and one-to-one mock interviews with an employer in the afternoon.
- Assemblies – Students in Year 11 will have assemblies in October by Caldew Sixth Form, Inspira, Carlisle College, Newton Rigg and the University of Cumbria which will provide them with information and details about how to access the courses on offer.
- Year 12 and 13 will have the opportunity to visit Northumbria University in September to gain a glimpse of university life and learn about the courses they offer.
- Year 12 and 13 will also have the opportunity to visit the "Careers Convention" at St James' Park in October.
- Year 10 students who study Health and Social Care have had the opportunity to attend "The Blue Light Event" at the University of Cumbria.
- The careers platform "KUDOS" has been introduced to Years 7 – 13. Students can access this using their own username and password and it provides them with excellent information, advice and guidance on all careers.
- A new careers focus area has been set up in the curve for Years 7-13. The information here signposts students to further career information.
- "Careers News" is now a feature on the school newsletter and is also displayed on the school information screens.
- Social Media is also being used in the form of Twitter and Instagram as a means by which CEIAG information is given to students.
- Young Enterprise Programme - Year 12 students will be able to take part in the programme.
- Guest Speakers will join us throughout the Autumn Term from various careers to speak to students in all year groups about the world of work.

PE News

District Football

Football Boots

We highly recommend that all boys have a pair of football boots for PE lessons. When they are on the field in the winter it prevents injuries caused by slipping and twisting in sports like rugby and football. Please note that students in mixed-gender PE groups may not participate in these sports on the school field. It is recommended that a gum shield is also worn for rugby.

Games Night is back!

The PE department introduced Games Night to make extracurricular sport available to all our students. This takes place every Tuesday night and a free bus is available to take students back to Carlisle at 4:30pm. Students should sign up in advance by 1:00pm on Mondays at the PE office if they wish to take the bus. The exact activities at present are:

- Football
- Rugby
- Hockey

With fixtures taking place on Wednesday and Thursday nights along with various other after-school activities, we hope that this approach will enable as many students as possible to participate. The games on offer will change as the year progresses and the weather and hours of daylight change.

Information

Safety at the Start and End of the School Day

Parking and access to the school is a continuing challenge. The road at the front of school gets very busy especially at the end of the school day and the safety of our students is obviously our priority. To that end, I would like to remind you that:

- Students should not be picked up or dropped off in the Visitors Car Park (next to Reception)
- Parents picking up students from the Sports Hall Car Park need to park in a designated space either by 3:00pm or wait until the buses have departed at 3:20pm.
- We do stop cars from leaving the Sports Hall Car Park until all the buses have left. To ensure students safety, no cars should be moving through the car park when students are walking through it to reach their buses.
- No cars should be parked in the bus bays along the front of the school at the end of the school day.
- Cars should not stop or park on the footpath opposite the school. It is dangerous for students to cross the road and increases the volume of traffic.
- Parents should never park in the roadway leading to Nestlés. This is a private road and is extremely busy with lorries constantly needing access to the site.
- If parking is not available at school there is a car park a short walk away in Dalston village.

Students Cycling to and from School

We encourage students to cycle to and from school as this is a healthy and environmentally-friendly way for them to travel. However we want students to do this safely and we are very lucky that the cycle path along the river to Carlisle is accessible directly from our grounds. The road outside school gets very busy, especially at the end of the school day and students sometimes ride out of the school gate without looking. Students must walk their bikes off the school site. If your child rides their bike to school, please can you talk to them about how to do this safely. We also strongly encourage students to wear cycle helmets. As we move into the darker mornings and evenings, please ensure students wear appropriate bright/high visibility clothing and their bikes are fitted with lights.

Applying for Free School Meals and Clothing Grants

Cumbria County Council has launched an online application process for Free School Meals and Clothing Grants. This can be found via the Citizen's portal, at this link:

The online service has a number of benefits:

- Parents/guardians are able to check eligibility without waiting for a phone call/email from the Service Centre.
- Reducing the risk of duplicate applications being submitted for the same child.
- Reducing the risk of application forms and supporting documentation getting lost in the post.
- Providing the Service Centre with an audit trail of applications.
- Enabling the Service Centre to issue vouchers in a more timely manner; a postal application takes twice as long to process as an online application.

Free school meals and clothing vouchers may be available if parents/guardians are receiving one of the following qualifying benefits:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

Children who are paid these benefits directly, instead of through a parent or guardian, can also get free school meals.

Attendance

Did you know, 90% attendance is 20 school days missed? This is 100 missed hours of learning.

Caldew School has made significant progress in raising awareness about the importance of attendance. We started with developing Caldew School community's understanding about the importance of attendance as a life skill. We then made the link between low attendance being a cause for low academic achievement and we are now developing teaching strategies to support students with missed learning caused by absence. Students have the responsibility to catch-up on missed learning. In addition to class teaching catch-up strategies we have an 'Attendance Catch-up Club'. If a student is absent for a period of time they will be asked to attend after school. These one hour sessions, facilitated by an Academic Mentor, are designed to help students catch up on the English, Maths and Science work that has been missed. If your child is required to attend, you will be contacted. Students can also go to Attendance Catch-up Club voluntarily, please contact your child's Head of Year if you would like them to attend a session. Attendance Catch-up Club is held on Tuesdays and Thursdays between 3:10 and 4:10pm.

As a result of these interventions, attendance is improving. However, to make further progress we need the whole school community to be aiming high to improve and sustain their attendance. Termly rewards will continue and it is pleasing to hear so many students already aiming for the prestigious Diamond Reward for 100% attendance for the whole academic year.

If you need to discuss your child's attendance or if your child needs to be absent from school for any reason you need to contact the school before 9:30am on each day of the absence. Thank you for supporting our aim of a school community with 100% attendance.

Holidays and Other Absences in Term Time

I would like to remind parents as usual at this time of the year of the following extract from the school's Attendance Policy:

Parents should not book family holidays during term time as they will not be authorised unless there are exceptional circumstances, such as a parent returning on leave from active military service.

Parents may request other leave of absence, however, authorisation of this will be at the discretion of the school, and will only be considered in exceptional circumstances. This means that in the majority of cases requests will not be authorised unless there are clear immediate family reasons or educational benefits.

Penalty Notices may be issued by the Headteacher against parents who take unauthorised holidays or leave of absence in term time. Each situation will be considered on an individual basis.

If leave is granted, parents must appreciate it is their responsibility to ensure their child catches up with any missed work upon their return.

Contacting Staff

Communication with you as parents is the key to ensuring that together we can improve the outcomes for students. You can find e-mail addresses on the dedicated staff page on the school website and staff will normally respond to you within 24 hours. If you wish to speak to a member of staff then please contact the school's reception. As most staff teach the majority of the day, they may not be available to take a call. They will return calls as soon as is possible, although in some cases that may not be until the following day. I would encourage all parents to contact us as soon as you have any concerns or questions. Dealing with issues quickly means that they rarely become insurmountable. As always, if you have any concerns about how a matter has been dealt with please do contact myself, Mr Hammond or Miss Atkinson (Deputy Headteachers) directly and we will make every effort to address your concerns.
